20b. Quantifies

Why It's Important

Once your child can count out one object, she may be ready to add to her count. While she has probably heard and used the word *more*, she may not understand how adding more changes the quantity of items.

Materials

Felt board; felt apples and apple tree; words to the following poem: Way up high in the apple tree, Two little apples smelled sweet to me. I shook that tree as hard as I could, Down came the apples... yum, they were good.

What You Do

- 1. Set up the felt board and the apple tree. Place the apples within your child's reach.
- 2. Invite your child to play with the felt board. Explain that you will say the rhyme together and then she may add and remove apples on the felt board.
- 3. Encourage your child to repeat the rhyme, each time changing the quantity of apples on the tree as appropriate for her.
- 4. With each repetition, ask your child if she can add more apples or take more apples from the board. Can you add more apples to our tree? I see you've added two apples. That is more apples than we had before.
- 5. Continue the activity for as long as she is interested. Keep the felt board available for her to use at a later time.
