Who's That?

Primary Objectives

9a. Uses an expanding expressive vocabulary

Why It's Important

Children understand language before being able to express themselves. Initially, your child will be able to answer yes/no questions. As her language develops, you will observe her answering you with one- or two-word responses.

Materials

Colored construction paper; markers; camera; lamination supplies; fasteners such as stapler, brads, rings, glue stick

What You Do

- 1. Throughout the week, take photographs of your family members as they participate in various daily routines.
- 2. Print the pictures and share them with your child. Explain that you would like to use the pictures to create a photo album for your family.
- 3. Give your child a glue stick so she can help you attach each photo to a piece of paper. Demonstrate how to spread the glue on the photo and paste it to the paper.
- 4. Once the pictures are attached to the album pages, engage your child in a discussion about each picture. Who is that in the picture? What is she doing?
- 5. Repeat your child's words back to her and write them underneath each photo.
- 6. When all of the photos have been labeled, bind the pages together.
- 7. Read the finished photo album together. Encourage your child to share it with other family members.
- 8. You can vary this activity by creating a wall of photographs instead of a photo album.
